To Our Valued Patients:

On October 25, 2021, Tri-State Perinatology updated visitor restrictions for our patients. These restrictions are aimed at continuing to reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission for both patients and staff. We understand that these restrictions are burdensome to patients and their families alike, but they are an important part of our hospital's disease mitigation strategy. Please be advised of the updated restrictions:

- 1. All patients will be allowed 2 visitors for their visit. Visitors must be 16 years or older.
- 2. All patients and visitors will be required to wear a mask.
- 3. All patients should routinely monitor themselves for any of the following symptoms of COVID-19 per CDC recommendations prior to an appointment.
 - New loss of taste or smell
 - Fever (100.0° or greater) currently, or in the past 72 hours
 - Chills or shaking chills
 - Cough
 - Shortness of breath
 - Sore throat
 - Muscle pain
 - Headache
 - Congestion or runny nose

If a patient has signs and/or symptoms of COVID-19, she will need to contact Tri-State Perinatology at 812-842-4550 prior to her appointment to reschedule. Additional instructions will be given regarding care and/or testing.

- 4. All patients and visitors will be screened upon arrival to The Women's Hospital and before coming up to Tri-State Perinatology. If a patient has signs and/or symptoms of COVID-19 at that time, she will be advised to return to her car and further instructions will be given. If a visitor fails screening, he or she will be restricted from coming to the appointment.
- 5. Tri-State Perinatology reserves the right to restrict access to any and all patients and their visitors in the event there is evidence or worsening community spread of COVID-19 or a patient or visitor willfully fails to comply with the visitor policy.
- 6. Changes to this policy may occur without notice.
